Don't fear public speaking – it's your time to shine

WORK OUT THE FIRST WORDS THAT YOU WILL SAY

The beginning of any presentation is the most challenging because this is when you will be the most nervous and the audience will be the most sceptical. So it's important for you and them that you make a solid start.

Knowing exactly the first sentence that will come out of your mouth will fill you with confidence. I like to start by asking the audience a closed question by a show of hands.

LIST THREE POINTS THAT YOU WILL SPEAK ON

Three bullet points is all you need. Remember, this is a topic you know intimately because you are passionate about it. You don't need to write down what you are going to say as that is too much work and during your

presentation you don't have to remember what it is you wrote down. Not having to remember this is one less thing toworry about as there's nothing you can forget to say.

KNOW HOW YOU WILL FINISH

This is the message that you worked out in step two. Write this out and practise it as much as you can prior to the presentation. I like to use quotes from famous people that relate to my central message as part of my conclusion.

So remember: the only parts of the presentation you have to write down and practise are steps two and five.
